Call to Order: President Struckman called the meeting to order.

**CATTAIL CROSSING GOLF COURSE
BOARD REPORT
MAY 2018**

Notes:

- The driving range was opened for the season on April 24 and the Blue and Yellow course were opened to play on April 27. The Red course was opened to play on May 4.
- The irrigation system was started for the season on May 7. There were a few small breaks which is normal but, unfortunately, a major issue occurred in the pump house. The majority of these issues have since been resolved with a couple of repairs currently being undertaken.
- Millings were acquired and added to the cart path crossing on 3 Blue in an effort to make this crossing better. Additional millings hope to be obtained so that we may resolve some of the same issues on the other crossings.
- The budget process has begun with personnel and CIP requests for 2019 having already been submitted.
- The main bathroom on the course has been opened.
- With the late start to the season, normal spring aeration will not be performed but other venting and cultural activities will be done on a frequent basis.
- A full complement of staff will be in place following Memorial Day and all maintenance tasks will begin to be performed on a regular basis.
- Fertilizer and fungicide applications have been made according to developed programs. We will begin with herbicide treatments in the near future.
- The staff has already been busy undertaking and completing some 'in house' projects. Bunkers are being edged and re-worked to make these areas more playable and aesthetic.
- We have already hosted the Class B Pre-Region and Region tournaments.

Upcoming

- We will be hosting the Class B state tournament June 3, 4 & 5.
- The staff will be making on-going fertilizer/fungicide applications to the greens, tees and fairways on the course.
- Additional "in house" projects, according to the vision committee plan, will begin as time allows.
- Additional trees will be planted around the course.

Recreation Board Report May 2018

- Summer programs will be starting up as we head into June and so far the registration numbers are looking very good. The month of June is packed with baseball/softball, basketball camps, tennis, art programs, track and field, gymnastics, fishing derby and many, many more.
- Staff is all hired and have gone through the paperwork sessions at City Hall and are now ready for pre-season in service and meetings.
- Baseball/Softball numbers have been really good, especially with now having Premier Fields, we are now able to have most if not all of our programs during the evening. T-Ball which has been during the noon hour has seen a big increase, as we heard from many people that it was hard to take off of work, but now that is not a problem and many people have thanked us for doing so.
- Preparations with the Watertown Family Aquatic Center are about complete. Just some finishing touches with cleaning and getting all the furniture and signs up.
- New tables, chairs and tubes were ordered and ready for the new season at the WFAC.
- The Ice Arena floor was scrubbed by Recreation staff as Roller Derby will be coming in the first weekend of June for their first bout and Relay for Life will be there in mid-June.
- Through two portions of the budget for 2019. Always interesting to see the changes from the previous year or years. With adding the Prairie Lakes Wellness Center Park and Rec. Gyms we have more than doubled the rentals that we had from the past year. Even with the PLWC Park and Rec. Gyms we saw much higher numbers than before for the Auditorium and Fieldhouse. The Auditorium in 2018 has already more rental dates used than all of 2017 at this point. We will continue to get the word out that we have these facilities for rentals of all sorts of activities.
- The 6th. Annual Senior Health Fair was held at the Watertown Senior Activities Center on May 18 with a decent crowd attending. Rain fell the entire time, which keeps a lot of the seniors away. Next year we will look at tweaking the time frame from 11am-12:30pm, and then have a main speaker for the ones that want to attend. We have never had any speakers as we tried to be as different from the Senior Seminar put on by the Watertown Area Council for the Aging, but they have discontinued from doing those. So now we are cleared to change it up a bit and after 6 years making some changes will be needed to maintain or to grow the attendance.
